- The foundation does not fund the research and development of technology (e.g., funds to develop hybrid automobiles or commercialization of an invention).
- The foundation does not fund demonstration projects (e.g., model solar homes).
- The foundation does not fund community energy projects.
- The foundation does not fund endowments or debt reduction, nor does it make general-support grants. The foundation does not support annual fund-raising campaigns or capital construction. The foundation does not support the planning, renovation, maintenance, retrofit, or purchase of buildings; the purchase of equipment; or the acquisition of land, even if the intent is to save energy.

How to Apply

RGK Foundation revised the grant application procedures in 2002 and no longer considers unsolicited grant proposals. All applicants must now complete an electronic Letter of Inquiry from the Web site as the first step. Organizations that submit unsolicited proposals or letters of inquiry will be mailed a postcard directing them to submit an electronic Letter of Inquiry via the Web site. After reading the remaining application guidelines, you may click on the link at the bottom of the page to begin.

Eligibility

Grants are made only to nonprofit organizations certified as tax exempt under Sections 501(c)(3) or 170(c) of the Internal Revenue Code and are classified as "not a private foundation" under Section 509(a). Hospitals, educational institutions, and governmental institutions meeting these requirements are eligible to apply. Organizations that have completed and filed Form 1023 but not yet received an IRS determination letter are not eligible to apply. The Foundation does not make grants or loans to individuals.

Accompanying all letters must be a copy of a letter of determination from the Internal Revenue Service certifying 501(c)(3) status that the organization is tax exempt and is not a private foundation under Code 509(a).

ENVIRONMENT

As the primary area of EFA funding in 2002, grants in the environmental field mainly focused on approaches to sustainable agriculture, protection and restoration of water quality and habitat, providing technical assistance and training to environmental groups, promotion of renewable energy and energy conservation, land conservation and protection of roadless forest areas, and strengthening of genetic engineering regulation and testing. To accomplish this, the foundation strives to help "people in deprived conditions to develop the skills, motivation and teamwork they need to become productive contributors to society. This could include support for quality pre-schools, youth activities, mentoring programs, job training, rehabilitation, and other services which are not adequately provided." The foundation also helps "to create conditions in which people can make good use of their skills and motivation. This could include support for creation of job opportunities, resources for entrepreneurs, community networks, safe neighborhoods, and healthy environments." The avalanche of proposals that we have received since October of 2002 has led us to re-evaluate and refine our criteria for awarding grants. We have decided to focus on programs that aim to produce permanent improvements in peoples' lives by means of short-term interventions. Such programs address acute problems that block people's chances at critical moments in their lives. Interventions may take a few months, or even a few years, but in the end they enable beneficiaries to overcome the obstacles in their way, and to shift their lives onto promising paths.

We will favor applicants who can best demonstrate a tangible, direct connection between the services their programs provide and the positive shifts that take place in individuals' lives. We will also give preference to organizations whose chances of success can be significantly increased by our support.

None of these criteria are absolute, and we are still in the process of defining our niche. However, these criteria imply that we are now less likely to support programs that provide educational enrichment, services for the handicapped, or activity centers for children — all highly worthwhile endeavors, but not within our scope.

Also outside the scope of our revised mission will be religious organizations that use their charitable programs to promote religious doctrines, foreign organizations that are not incorporated in the United States, and individuals who are seeking financial assistance. We feel it is necessary to narrow our focus in this way in order to give thorough, careful consideration to proposals that do fall within our revised criteria.

The foundation invites proposals from nonprofit organizations that serve Washington, Oregon, Idaho, British Columbia, western Montana (including the Rocky Mountain Range), and coastal Alaska, from Cook Inlet to the Canadian border. Within these broad parameters, the foundation focuses its grantmaking activities in energy and climate change; forests and land ecosystems; growth management and transportation; public outreach, education, and capacity building; rivers, wetlands, and estuaries; sustainable agriculture; and toxic substances, mining, and radioactive waste. Visitors to the foundation's Web site will find program descriptions, grant application and final report instructions, printable grant applications, detailed grantee information, a report from the foundation's president (Denis Hayes, national coordinator of the first Earth Day in 1970), an FAQ section, board and staff listings, preliminary financial statements, and contact information.

The Foundation seeks to accelerate a region-wide commitment to the ultra-efficient use of energy sources that are safe, renewable, and comparatively benign in their environmental impacts. The Foundation's long-term goal is for the Pacific Northwest to produce less pollution (including greenhouse gases) per unit of Gross Domestic Product than any other comparable region of the world.

Objectives

- Encourage significant, cost-effective investments in energy by industry, utilities, government, and individuals to dramatically increase the efficiency of energy use in every sector.
- Promote solar, wind, biomass, and geothermal energy development at appropriate locations and with minimal environmental impact.
- Advance regional leadership in the widespread use of hydrogen and fuel cells as fundamental building blocks of the next energy era.
- Dramatically reduce emissions of greenhouse gases.

Tactics

- Intervene in regulatory processes on behalf of green electricity options, renewable portfolio standards, system benefits charges, net metering, and least-cost energy planning.

- Push for incentives to encourage the renewable energy industry to locate factories, research facilities, and energy production facilities in the Northwest.
- Encourage state, county, and city agencies to choose the most efficient buildings, vehicles, office equipment, lighting, and other products - and build a public base of support for smart procurement.
- Reach out to groups - such as farmers, architects, developers, city planners, utilities - for which smart energy could provide major benefits and attempt to enlist them as allies.
- Encourage media attention to the importance of climate and other environmental impacts of outdated energy policies and to the opportunities for regional leadership with new energy technologies.
